About us - Outdoor Education Unit

The role of **The Outdoor Education Unit** is to help support local authority schools, teachers and youth workers on all issues relating to educational visits and to develop and promote Learning Outside the Classroom.

We provide guidance, advice and ‘educational visits approvals’ for residential and adventurous activities. We also ‘vet’ accommodation and activity providers on behalf of schools and youth centres to ensure that they meet Kent County Council (KCC) requirements and national good practice guidelines.

The other key part of our role is to develop and promote Learning Outside the Classroom and to provide training for schools and youth establishments.

The Outdoor Education Unit Training Service

The training service was developed to provide CPD/INSET training to teachers, youth workers and other staff working with young people in all aspects of educational visits and education outside the classroom.

We aim to provide a range of courses to help staff feel more confident about planning and leading educational visits in a wide range of environments. We also develop specific skills and understanding of policies and good practice relating to managing educational visits within schools and youth establishments.

The Outdoor Education Advisors Panel

The **Outdoor Education Advisors Panel (OEAP)** is made up of representatives from local authority’s (LA) across the UK. It works in partnership with the Department for Education (DfE) and many other bodies helping to advise and develop policy, training and good practice guidelines for Outdoor Education and educational visits.



The Educational Visit Coordinator, Educational Visit Leader and Outdoor Learning Card courses are national OEAP validated courses.



1. Educational Visits Coordinator (EVC) training

A course for those staff who are responsible for managing educational visits for young people.

Audience:

Foundation; KS1; KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

Course content:

This course aims to develop the core competencies to help in the coordination of risk management and assessment, supervision and leadership of all educational visits. It is a nationally recognised course and follows a syllabus developed by the Outdoor Education Advisors Panel (OEAP).

It is recommended by Department for Education that every school has an EVC to help coordinate and manage educational visits. This is also a recommended course for Area Youth Officers (AYOs) managing off-site visits and activities.

- Managing risk through risk assessment.
- Insurance for educational visits.
- Equal opportunities and inclusion.
- Competence, supervision and leadership skills.

3. Educational Visit Leader training

A course to increase confidence, awareness and group management skills when leading outdoor visits and activities.

Audience:

Foundation; KS1; KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work.

Course content:

This is a very practical course aimed at teachers, youth workers and other people working with young people in outdoor environments.

This course aims to help develop knowledge, understanding and practical group management skills in different environments to help staff feel more confident leading educational visits.



It is a nationally recognised course and follows a syllabus developed by the Outdoor Education Advisors Panel (OEAP).

Learning outcomes:

- The purpose and value of educational visits.
- Current good practice on educational visits.
- Managing risk and practical risk assessment.
- Practical experience in a range of outdoor environments - including by water, lowland country, urban areas, etc.
- Practical strategies for group control and management in outdoor environments.
- Safe management of pupils using minibuses and other transport.
- Basic navigation and map work.
- A fun day out where you talk to other teachers and youth workers and share ideas and experiences!

4. Risk management and planning for educational visits

A course for anyone wanting to feel more confident planning and managing visits.

Foundation; KS1; KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

This is a course to help teachers, youth workers and anyone working with young people. It focuses on the importance of risk management, and how to use it effectively in planning for educational visits.

This course also provides a forum for discussion and helps to alleviate fears and clear-up misconceptions about issues surrounding educational visits.

10. An introduction to canoeing, kayaking and rafting

Learn to paddle and see how it can help develop the confidence, teamwork and communication skills of your young people.

KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Youth Work; Special Needs; Governors.

Course content:

This course is designed to introduce you to the world of paddle sports. It covers the whole range of paddling options from open canoes and kayaks to improvised raft building, with activities suitable for all ages and abilities.

Paddling and canoe journeys can also contain great cross curricular links to geography, history, literacy, numeracy and art; as well as developing teamwork, problem solving and communication skills.

11. An introduction to dinghy sailing and windsurfing

Explore how harnessing the power of wind and learning to sail and windsurf can benefit young people.

Audience:

KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

Course content:

This course is designed to introduce you to the world of dinghy sailing and windsurfing, and explore the links to the curriculum (including science, design and technology, PE, etc) and opportunities to develop teamwork and personal development.



You will have the chance to experience sailing in a variety of types of sailing dinghies and boats to suit all ages and abilities; learning about the wind and how to harness it.

Bewl Water Outdoor Centre is fully equipped with facilities for people with disabilities and special needs.

12. An introduction to climbing (indoor and outdoor)

Experience the vertical world, and how it can be used to unlock hidden skills and potential in young people.

Audience:

KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

Course content:

This course is designed to introduce you to world of climbing, and how it can benefit your young people in developing teamwork, trust, self confidence, self-esteem and help them to believe in their own abilities.

The course will look at a range of climbing activities, from bouldering (low climbing without ropes), using artificial climbing walls to abseiling and roped climbing outside on real rock.

Learning outcomes:

- To introduce the concept and benefits of Outdoor Learning.
- Direct links to the academic and wider school and youth work curriculum.
- Practical hands on sessions, exploring movement, climbing skills and techniques, rope work and safety and equipment.
- A chance to explore how these activities could benefit your young people.
- Discussions on differentiation for different ages and abilities, and adaptations for special needs.
- Be able to advise young people on the opportunities to further their climbing experiences.

KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

Course content:

This course is designed to introduce you to the world of cycling and mountain biking, and see how this great activity can help your young people succeed.

The course will give you experience of a range of cycling activities, cycling skills, cycle maintenance and route planning, and how to create a wide range of links to the academic and wider school and youth work curriculum.



Learning outcomes:

- To introduce the concept and benefits of Outdoor Learning.
- Direct links to the academic and wider school and youth work curriculum.
- Practical hands on sessions, exploring bike design and basic maintenance, cycling skills and techniques, mountain biking skills and safety and equipment.
- Trail rides and an opportunity to experience single track mountain biking.
- A chance to explore how these activities could benefit your young people.

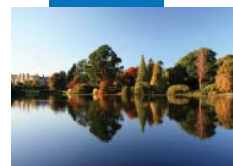

17. KCC Southern Sandstone Leaders Award (SSLA) – rock climbing

A qualification to lead young people on Kent’s unique local sandstone rocks and crags.

Audience:

KS2; KS3; KS4; KS5; Special Needs; Youth Work; Governors.

Course content:

These courses are designed to train, assess and qualify you to lead young people rock climbing on Kent’s own unique and special Southern Sandstone rock outcrops. The training will cover how to climb and manage groups on these delicate crags, rope work for top-roped climbing and rescue, equipment and safety techniques. To gain the most out of this course, and qualify for assessment, you will need previous climbing experience (up to a 4a standard), including belaying and top-rope climbing - this is not a course for beginners. A valid first aid certificate will be required to validate the award. This qualification cannot be used as a qualification for use on artificial climbing walls, and crags outside the Southern Sandstone area - other national governing body awards are appropriate for these activities.



Learning outcomes:

- An introduction to the unique Southern Sandstone crags and environment.
- Planning and teaching basic climbing skills and bouldering.
- Managing groups in a climbing environment.
- Safety, rope work and equipment.
- Dealing with problems and rescue techniques.
- Access, conservation and the etiquette.

This course is led by Chris Tullis, one of the most experienced climbers in the South East, and an expert on the local Southern Sandstone crags. 21. What are Forest Schools activities?

“If you go down to the woods today, you’re sure of a big surprise..... lot’s of young people enjoying the fantastic learning opportunities that woodlands have to offer!”

Forest schools

Originating in Scandinavia, the concept and philosophy of Forest School has been developing across the UK, with the first professional practitioner training commencing in 2000. Since then, Forest School has been recognised as a professional and valuable area of outdoor learning with many children and young people taking part in Forest School programmes across the country. From early years in primary schools, through to secondary schools and youth groups. Forest Schools are for all abilities from special needs, to gifted and talented – everyone will benefit from participation in Forest School – including the teaching staff!



Forest School is an inspirational process that offers children and young people regular outdoor experiences throughout the year in all weathers, (ideally weekly for a minimum of 12 sessions, instead of a one-off visit) to maximise the learning potential of a local woodland or natural space. Forest School activities increase the skills and knowledge of the individuals who take part, ranging from creative play, through to practical skills such as fire lighting and camp fire cooking, and working with bladed and traditional woodland hand tools.

Forest School programmes are run by qualified and experienced Forest School Leaders. This could be your own trained staff or leaders from a local provider.

The Forest School setting is very adaptable and allows for a flexible approach to learning that can accommodate a wide range of learning styles. The Forest School approach allows young people to direct their own learning and teaching methods and can be shaped to individual children’s learning needs. Confidence is increased through having the freedom, time and space to learn, grow and make independent, safe choices by helping children and young people learn to manage their own risks.

Forest school activities

Forest Schools programmes offer a wide range of outdoor experiences – creative play, woodland and environmental activities – all according to the age group and abilities. Activities such as, shelter & den building; fire lighting and cooking; using traditional woodland hand tools to create wonderful natural craft items; survival techniques; animal tracking; plant and animal identification; environmental games and art – all increasing knowledge and understanding for the environment and natural surroundings.

Woodlands and other natural areas (such as beach, downs etc) are a fantastic resource for creating a stimulus to use back in the classroom or youth centre. Forest School experiences and activities can also be very successfully linked to cross-curricular learning and academic teaching with the positive effects having lasting results back in the classroom, and at home.

26. Investigating Rivers - What do you know about your river?

A course for teaching staff to explore how to study rivers with KS2 pupils, using the River Darent at Horton Kirby.

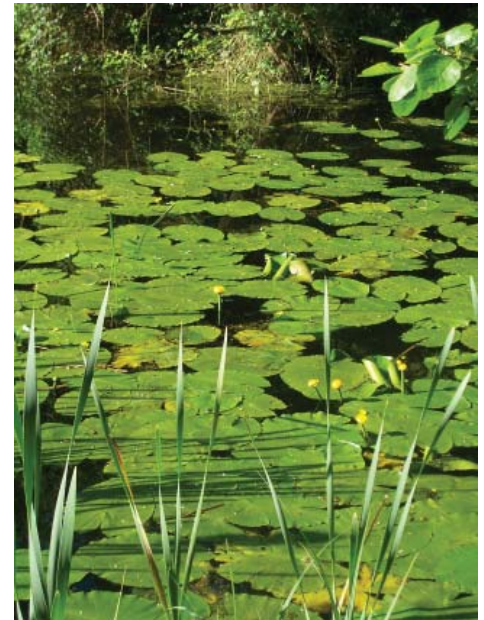

29. Setting up a wildlife area

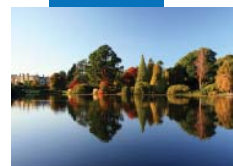
